





Freeway graffiti taggers pick up pace

More and more these days, Silicon Valley freeway signs are being turned into canvases for graffiti "taggers" who deface them so severely that it's hard to see what the sign actually says.

Maintenance crews have been kept busy removing graffiti this winter as the number of incidents reported to the California Department of Transportation in January and February increases — requiring workers to sandwich graffiti removal between storm cleanup.

According to Caltrans, there have been 16 reports of graffiti on freeway signs in the past six weeks, compared with five incidents in December and three in September Officials say, however, that these statistics may not truly reflect the problem because many incidents go unreported.

ten done at night, baffles both Caltrans and law enforcement officials.

"Who knows why it happened more in the winter?" said Ray Fox, the Caltrans supervisor charged with collecting complaints and dispatching cleanup crews "I assume that a bunch of kids just decided to get together and go out and do some tagging."

The nocturnal graffiti scrawling produces few arrests compared with the large number of incidents, law enforcement officials say.

"Catching these kids is very difficult," California Highway Patrol officer Shannon Seda said. "It happens in the middle of the night when there are no witnesses. How these kids figure out how to get up there, I have no idea. You know they're putting their lives in danger."

Taggers in Santa Clara County who are prosecuted—they usually receive community service hours and/or a bill for their damage—end up in the Anti-Graffiti Program run by San Jose. The program assigns—community—service hours to offenders and sends damage bills to them or their families.

Since January 1997, when a state law said cities could recover damages from those who deface property with graffiti, the city has billed 76 offenders, according to program coordinator Jaclin

Cordes.

Law enforcement officials say taggers are usually juveniles or young adults and roam in teams but are not gang members and usually are not violent. They crave widespread attention for their graffiti - which they consider to be "artwork" - and put it on highly visible freeway signs, overpasses and soundwalls, said Sgt. Matt Elvander of the San Jose Police Department's juvenile unit. Frequently seen monikers of local tagging crews include "ADS" (Artistically Damaging Cities) and "DYC" (Destroying Your Cities).

Street gangs tend to inscribe

mark their territory for the benefit of rival gangs, Elvander said. Gang graffiti usually stay in neighborhoods where gang members live.

Fox says Caltrans employs a number of measures to deter freeway sign taggers, including re-

moving the catwalks around signs to foil easy access and installing sheet metal "hoods" with pointed projections around signs and "col-

lars," or hoops, on posts.

A total of 120 incidents of freeway sign tagging were reported in Santa Clara County in 1997, according to Fox. Alameda County had 100. But San Francisco County reported only 18, and San Mateo County tallied 19, he said.

"Other areas do have the same problem; I hear about it when I go to area conferences," said Zulma Maciel, who works for the antigraffiti program. "Maybe people here are reporting it more, and maybe taggers in San Francisco don't have the easy access (to freeway signs) that they do down

The NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research will monitor the legislation over the next two years to ensure spray-paint cans are kept out of the hands of those who want to use them to damage our community property.

These laws are about sending a clear message that we are after the repeat offenders - and not

September 1. On the same day, State Rail will enforce new on-the-spot penalties for graffiti vandalism

fines doubling from \$200 to \$400.

Vivernier Bob Carr said a campaign to alert retailers, parents and teenagers to the changed law on spraysales would start tomorrow. "Graffiti costs many millions of dollars a year to government, business and seholders," he said.

The Government is keen to implement new and innovative approaches in our fight against graffiti. "One way is to limit access to spray paint."

He said the laws, passed late last year, were patterned on the ban on the sale of knives to minors.

The Government has distributed 11,000 anti-graffiti resource kits, including point-of-sale signage, to hardware stores, art supply stores, service stations and newsagencies.


Similar spray-can provisions exist in South Australia, as well as several US jurisdictions including New York and Los Angeles. The crackdown on selling spray cans to minors was welcomed by Brendan

Cullen of Cullen's Hardware Store at Waverley. We can all do without the amount of graffiti that's going up," Mr Cullen said.


We've never sold to school kids at our shop, but I can say that the new laws have made us even more wary than before.

"If there is any doubt about the person's age, we ask for proof of age."


Transport Minister Michael Costa said extra transit officers were patrolling CityRail trains and stations to combat fare evasion, drunkenness, property damage and graffiti. "Graffiti removal costs State Rail \$11 million annually and our cleaners remove 154,000 graffiti tags from trains every year" he said









