


DERO INTERVIEW

John "POEM" had the best style for lettering and BABY 168, from the letter lines. HOW MANY PIECES HAVE YOU DONE? Too many. HOW LONG DO YOU PLAN ON WRITING? Until I drop dead. HAVE YOU DONE CANVASES? Yes and I plan to do more in the future. WHERE DID YOU DO MOST OF YOUR CARS, TUNNELS OR LAYUPS? The layups only because it was easier when it came to taking pictures when finished. 














It was a saturday afternoon, in 1973. My brother MAD, a few friends, and I were in the six yard. I had done a piece in the third lane, and was so excited that I wanted to come back that evening to do another piece. Before we left we were all playing, and messing around the yards, blowing the horns on the trains was always fun. As we had just past through the hole in the fence a transit police car drove up. I still was very young at the time, I paniced, and climbed over the barbed wire fence, into the junk yard I ran rolling down a slimy oil pit, out of the yard, and ran all the way home. I went to a friend and neighbor Hughy, and asked if he could drive me to the police station because, I thought my brother had been caught writing on the trains. Not having found my brother at the station I swore to myself that I would never go back to the yards. This was before I finally found my brother who told me that it had not been a raid on the yard but, that someone had been mugged and that the police only wanted to know why we were there, and if we had seen anything. Not to mention that my running out of there like a bat out of hell, did'nt make them look very well. Even after all that I did go back that night, and did yet another of my many pieces that soon followed my first time.

I can remember going shopping with my mother, and as we waited for our train I watched the trains across the platform. I liked the more colorful ones I remember liking pieces by BAT 1, LOVE 1, PEACE 2, TAKE 5, so I suppose you can say the trains inspired me. Before I knew It I found

myself sitting alone watching the trains.

I am going to mention BLADE, and LEE together but, not against each other, I liked LEE'S letters the more advanced ones. I liked LEE for his perfection as well. I liked BLADE for the imagination involved in his pieces. I liked KEL for his style. Mitch had good designs, and colors I especially enjoyed his older more basic stuff. I also liked the MG boys stuff.those are the writers that over the years I can say I appreciated.

Looking back when UA came about I remember a kid who lived on zeriga that wrote NO 1, he did not get up much but, he was the one who actually came up with the name UNITED ARTIST. I organized the crew that consisted of me SEEN, MAD, P.JAY, SIN, DUST, and NO 1. For the amount of damage we did a larger crew was not needed. In time we all started to go our own ways and the crew broke up.

I don't really understand why someone would want to give someone else who already has the fame more exposure than what they already have by writing the same name. What's the point when people involved in the graffiti scene know who is who. If anyone is serios about Graffiti they should know that now it will save them alot of embarrasement. And for those who cross out other writers, do it because they feel that is how they are going to get the fame. So having my name used or crossed out is something I have gotten used to over the years. The best thing to do is to try to ignore it. I suppose the attraction came from the actual act. The excitement from




being able to get away. Ultimately it came from the feeling of once seeing a piece you did go by like a moving billboard that says that's me, I was here. Knowing that people all over the city see your name. Not to mention the fame that came with it. Also, I must mention that it is like an addiction you can never get enough. I certainly do not expect someone who is not involved in graffiti to understand but, believe me it is exciting. It seemed instantaneous that once P.JAY, MAD, and I had got onto the Zeriga tracks that a bunch of toys sat on the platform to watch us.

The yards were hot. It was about three o' clock in the morning we had just finished the outline when it started to drizzle. We decided to leave it unfinished, and come back the next day. MAD was still on the tracks trying to complete the fill in while P.JAY, and I were on the platform watching for the train when I heard a walkie talkie off in the distance. I turned to see two detectives coming up the stairs. Then saw uniformed police across on the other platform. P.JAY and I did'nt waste any time we jumped onto the tracks, then onto the catwalk running toward Westchester Station. As we were running I could see police cars underneath the tracks on the persuit, I could hear footsteps stomping and splashing because it was now raining heavily, and all I couldfeel was P.JAY pushing me to run faster. Meanwhile my feet were already a mile in front of me. By this time we had past westchester station, and were headed for middletown, when I finally turned to find that the footsteps persuing us were MAD'S MC boots trying desperatly to keep up with our fast pace. In all that confusion we forgot he was still with us. without question it was a night I will always remember.



every writer before me.

WHO ARE SOME OF THE BEST WRITERS TO YOU? Min, Dondi

Tack, Skeme, Iz the wiz.

WHAT DO YOUR PARENTS THINK OF YOUR TRAINS? I keep

them out of this.

WHAT TRAIN LINES DID YOU BOMB? All.

WHO ARE SOME OF THE BEST WRITERS YOU'VE BOMBED WITH Mesh, Ghost, Ven, Wane, Ja, basicly everyone who's

down with the scene for real.

is pretty fucked up. ANY LAST WORDS? Since I've begun I've seen writers


come and go, PEACE to everyone I kool with.


